

Telling time

Get a statement piece such as a wall clock designed by American designer George Nelson whose fascination for clocks led him to believe that people used clocks to read time by discerning the relative position of the hands, which made the use of numbers unnecessary. Furthermore, since most people wore wristwatches, he assumed that clocks had become more of a decorative element for interiors. Well said indeed.

Light the way

Lamps are necessary in certain corners of a room and the Petite Potence by Jean Prouvé is perfect for a study room as the swing arm is 103 cm long, with a powder-coated finish in colours derived from the original hues used by Prouvé. The first version of the Potence wall lamp was created in the 1940s for his own home which was a simple light bulb affixed to a long, pivoting steel bar, which is held by a steel wire. This functionalist, purist design was soon produced in various sizes, with an added handle on larger models to facilitate the swivel movement.



A cut above the rest

Fresh cuts of flowers add cheer to any home and respect it by putting them in a Nuage vase. The design is reminiscent of a cloud, the motif done with aluminium profiles of varying lengths. The cavities in the basic form are now positioned upright, dividing the vase into eight individual tubes that can be used for the artful arrangement of flowers.



A marbling effect

L'Oiseau by Ronan & Erwan Bouroullec is an avian figure reminiscent of the simple artefacts of Nordic folk art and will sit perfectly on your bookshelf. Previously produced in wood or ceramic, L'Oiseau is now also available as a limited edition of 500 numbered pieces in Carrara marble.

Hermès Collections for the Home features soft furnishings that add a much-needed touch to turn your house into a cosy designer home; one that will be the envy of your neighbours. We invite you to discover home accessories, from tables and chairs to trays and rugs.



01 Les Trotteuses d'Hermès Side tables

Three heights, three diameters, three porcelain tops with colourful motifs fastened with bridle-leather straps, and a wooden base in solid oak which folds in and out with ease endow these three small round tables with a nomadic spirit for enhanced versatility. Individually, as a pair, or as a trio, the tables move effortlessly from one space to another around the home. More tops will be added every year to this collection-starting with Paper Block, Panier and H infini designs.



The simple lines of this games table contrast with the sumptuous details, craftsmanship and materials contained in the central chest. The table incorporates two reversible games surfaces in leather marquetry that are perfect for cards, chess, draughts or backgammon, with concealed compartments sheathed in H bull calf for storing playing pieces, dice and counters.



03 Manège Centerpieces and change trays

Colours and materials echo each other on these objects in shapes inspired by the racecourse. These change trays, trays and centrepieces combine simple lines with sophisticated know-how. The matt leather contrasts with the depth of the lacquer, which is obtained by applying around ten coats and two different shades.

04 Cordélie Rugs

The Tremplin, H Vibration and Escalator rugs have been delicately embroidered by hand. The compositions designed by Gianpaolo Pagni and Studio Hermès are traced out by a slender cord, as if drawn with a pencil. Against a highly robust linen backdrop, this slender cotton cord marks out the lines adorning the Cordélie rugs. A very rare and meticulous embroidery technique.





05 Armchair, chair and table

This set by British designer Jasper Morrison exudes lightness and simplicity. On closer inspection, the shapes of these three objects prove to be more complex: a bevelled tabletop, slanted legs, crisp corners on the outside that are rounded on the inside, slatted chair backs crafted from a single piece of wood, and seats with apertures in which a saddle-stitched leather pad fits perfectly for added comfort.





The allure of Van Holland

This luxury boutique condominium is the perfect home for those who desire both exclusivity and proximity to the cool vibe and lifestyle amenities of Holland Village.

Whether you're looking for a worthwhile investment or in search for a home for yourself or your family, Van Holland checks all the boxes for modern urban living in the prestigious District 10 area of Holland Road.

The new boutique project by Koh Brothers sits at the centre of a bustling lifestyle and entertainment hub that offers all the modern conveniences and amenities you need, including premier schools, banks and clinics, plus easy access to nearby parks and gardens, and offices in Orchard Road and One North business district.

Located along the main road and linked by a sheltered overhead bridge to Holland Village and its plethora of restaurants and retail outlets, including Holland Village MRT station and Raffles Medical, the condominium sits on an elevated site away from the bustle of Holland Road. It also happens to be the only newly-launched condominium project that is freehold.

Boutique life

What buyers will find desirable other than its attractive location is its exclusivity with only 69 units spread across three apartment blocks punctuated by lots of greenery all around its premises and even along the lengths of its façade. While two of the blocks measure five storeys high, one block is four storeys with an attic.

As you pull up into the driveaway, the property welcomes the visitor with a big dose of pomp and splendour showcasing a two-storey 10m waterfall accented by lush foliage. The magnificent water feature also provides cover and discreetly conceals the lobby from the main road, giving alighting passengers ample privacy.

Another fun feature located on the periphery of the condo's grounds is the Garden of Life – a tropical art corner filled with sculptures amid a lush landscape. By day, it is a multi-textured forest; by night, it becomes an illuminated wonderland.

For a cosy development of this size, residents will be pleased to know that the property offers not one but two infinity lap pools: a 26m infinity lap pool facing the main road which enjoys a good degree of privacy and shade from the trees below, and another panoramic sky pool at the rooftop terrace.

Up top is where you find all the luxury trimmings befitting of premium condominium with facilities such as a well-equipped gym, barbecue pavilion and clubhouse with 1,000 sq ft of indoor and outdoor space, complete with a pantry as well as a fully-operational kitchen. The Sky Club can also be converted into a versatile space for business meetings.

Luxury living

To cater to a broad range of budgets and living preferences, Van Holland offers plenty of diversity in terms of apartment sizes. In the blocks fronting Holland Village, there are 53 apartments featuring one-bedroom units from 495 sq ft, two-bedroom units from 657 sq ft, two-bedroom premium units from 710 sq ft, three-bedroom and three-bedroom plus study units from 1,055 sq ft, and four-bedroom units of 1,345 sq ft.

The third block at the back faces Good Class Bungalows in the tranquil Leedon Park estate and offers 16 exclusive units all with private lift access, two of which are four-bedroom apartments with



an attic. They include two-bedroom plus study apartments of 1,001 sq ft, and four-bedroom and four-bedroom plus attic with sizes from 1,593 to 1,991 sq ft.

The masculine interiors are set in monochromatic tones featuring dark wood carpentry set against white corniced walls to give the space a touch of opulence. To enlarge the living spaces, all the ceilings soar at a height of 3.1m complemented by floor-to-ceiling windows which offer unobstructed views of the world outside.

Plenty of attention to detail is also paid to the finishes and fixtures such as book-matched Arabescato Altissimo marble from Italy, which creates a stylish mirrored tile effect all throughout the living room floor and balcony. In the master bathroom, you'll also find slab-matched marble for the feature wall in the shower area.

The fully marbled master bathroom — the most pampered room in the house — glitters with Swarovski embellished faucets, hooks and racks, and spotlights luxury sanitaryware by Italian brand F.lli Frattini, in addition to state-of-the-art bathroom fittings by top-end German brand, Duravit.

Fun fact: During the planning process of the Van Holland project, CEO Francis Koh flew to Italy with his project team to not only visit the sanitaryware manufacturer but also the marble quarry to hand-select the marble blocks which are made from natural, non-cultured marble.

Other top-of-the-line finishes include Miele kitchen appliances, a wardrobe system with a pull-down garment rail system, dehumidifier and LED lights, and a customised privacy screen for the balcony area.

To cater to the digital savvy resident, every unit at Van Holland is fitted with a smart home system, to give you the convenience of controlling various functions and access to services via your smartphone. They include smart lighting and air-conditioning, parcel services, invitations and RSVPs, digital door lock, facilities booking and more.

The future is bright

With plans afoot to rejuvenate Holland Village with a variety of condominium projects, retail offerings and refreshed public spaces, Van Holland is set to become part of all that is new and happening in the vibrant enclave.

Its strategic location to the country's hippest neighbourhood, coupled with its freehold status, certainly makes this boutique condominium an excellent choice for investment. Your home here would be valued, not just for today, but for years to come.

If you've harboured dreams of downtown living, where work is just minutes away and your backyard consists of the best bars and restaurants in Singapore, look no further than One Bernam – a 351-unit mixed-use development located in the heart of Tanjong Pagar.

A destination in itself where one can enjoy integrated living and leisure under one roof, the 35-storey One Bernam, developed by Hao Yuan Investment and MCC Land, comes at the perfect time as the entire Core Central Region (CCR) of Singapore undergoes major revitalisation works to coincide with the introduction of the future Great Southern Waterfront.

This new coastal metropolis, located on the fringe of the CBD, stretches for 30km from Gardens by the Bay East all the way to Pasir Panjang, and will pave the way for more residential and lifestyle developments where waterfront living will be the new way of life.

While we wait for this major undertaking by the URA to take root, property developers have been hard at work with collective en bloc sales to rebuild the surrounding area into a prime lifestyle destination, and that includes the Anson-Tanjong Pagar district where you'll find One Bernam.

Perfect location with larger units

More than just a luxurious home in the city, One Bernam encompasses a life of infinite possibilities for you to live, work and play 24/7 in a multi-faceted location that blends old and new.

It is one of the first mixed-use projects in the vicinity to launch as part of the revival masterplan for Tanjong Pagar. This gives you not only the first-buyer advantage, but also first dibs to the district's exciting features such as new retail offerings, spacious courtyards that serve as outdoor "living rooms" for communities to gather, and greener streets linking the Rail Corridor to the CBD.

Its strategic location puts it across from Tanjong Pagar MRT Station and retail neighbours like 100AM and Guoco Tower. A short stroll will take you to some of the country's finest bars and restaurants in quaint conserved shophouses, plus comforting hawker fare including Michelin-listed stalls at nearby Chinatown.

One Bernam is also extremely well-connected. Tanjong Pagar MRT Station on the East-West Line is just one MRT stop from Raffles Place Interchange for the North-South and East-West Lines. Telok Ayer MRT Station on the Downtown Line is also within a few minutes' walk and two stops from Bayfront MRT Interchange for the Downtown and Circle Lines. Nearby, the upcoming Maxwell MRT Station on the Thomson-East Coast Line is expected to be completed within the next year.

Among other mixed-use projects in the CCR, One Bernam is by far the most affordable with prices from \$2,200 psf, giving investors and homeowners plenty of bang for their buck. On top of that, the interior spaces are comparatively more spacious than other developments with roomier bedrooms and bathrooms.

One-bedroom apartments are sized from 441 to 463 sq ft; two-bedroom and two-bedroom-plus study units range from 700 to 872 sq ft; three-bedroom homes measure at 1,421 sq ft; while three-bedroom penthouses are between 1,744 and 1,948 sq ft. The largest penthouse in the development is a 4,306 sq ft unit with five bedrooms.

Where nature meets architecture

Conceptualised by design behemoth DP Architects, One Bernam's streamlined façade takes inspiration from an urban forest where its towering height resembles tall pine trees, while the podium's curvilinear form is an expression of the forest floor.



The building is clearly segmented according to the layers of a rainforest. At the bottom, the Forest Floor features a two storey retail podium of 14 shops, and above that, a floor of 13 serviced offices, all to be managed by One Bernam. To create that dense forested feel, the podium will be fronted by a welcoming central piazza lined with conserved trees.

The Subcanopy Layer is the Level 4 Sky Terrace, home to a verdant high-rise garden split into two lifestyle zones, plus a lap pool with various activity decks and entertainment zones such as the Garden Dining Pavilion, Gourmet Function Room and Clubhouse.

The Canopy Layer that runs from Level 5 all the way to Level 34 will be composed of north-south facing residential units of all sizes.

The top-most Emergent Layer is Level 34's Sky Terrace, which enjoys spectacular high-rise views of the sea and cityscape. Over here, you'll find meditative corners like a Tatami Garden and Sky Hammock Garden for you to lay back and admire the sunrise or sunset. This is also the floor to enjoy an elevated workout at the Sky Fitness Club, and host stylish parties at the Sky Lounge Garden which features a tastefully-furnished function room with high ceilings, warm wood furniture and pendant lighting.

The penthouse will sit stoically on the 35th floor with nothing but endless sky above it.

The pinnacle of luxury living

The epitome of elevated living (in all senses of the word) begins five storeys above the main street where smaller units take up the lower floors, and move up in size as they go higher. For most of the three-bedroom units including the penthouse, residents will get to enjoy private lift access.

Each apartment reflects the very essence of refined luxury living with well-proportioned living spaces that exude timelessness, intuitiveness and enduring good taste, as seen in the choice of brands for fixtures and fittings.

For ceiling fans, the designers have chosen Haiku, a leading American brand that has won more than 75 international awards for exceptional design and technology. In the bathrooms, you'll find sanitaryware by Swiss brand Laufen and tapware from award-winning Italian brand Gessi. For kitchens, there's Swiss-made Franke for the basin and Gessi for the faucet; and world-renowned V Zug which will supply the cooker hood, hob, oven, washer, dryer and built-in fridge.

To take you into the future of a digitalised home, One Bernam makes smart living a reality through a Smart Gateway that connects and controls smart devices in your home from just one wireless hub.

Other high-tech features include a Smart Doorbell that allows you to see, hear and speak with visitors on the other side of your door; a Digital Lock to enjoy the convenience of going keyless; and Smart Air-Con Control that lets you turn your smartphone into an air-con remote control for the living and dining rooms. Penthouse owners will also enjoy the use of a Magic Mirror: a digital personal assistant that displays real-time updates on traffic, weather and your day's schedule.



Which is more challenging to do, residential or commercial?

Both projects have a fair share of challenges and also opportunities for our team to explore and break boundaries and capacities of what we can and cannot do.

What was the client's brief to you?


We were given a clear brief to undertake a full home renovation and transform the condominium with a focus on plush materials and premium finishes for a luxurious look. The family also requested for a quiet corner dedicated to praying.

The family loves to entertain so we focused greatly on the rooftop and entertainment area, where projector, outdoor speakers and marble bar were built.

PERSONALITY

What were some of the challenges you faced?

We had to be careful while selecting the colour palette in each of the spaces as one wrong shade could significantly alter the entire ambience of the place. The challenge for the living room was creating different pieces of wall panelling and wall finishes. We had to find a way to section long walls and so we used trimming and wood laminate to really divide and create a smaller perception of the long walls.





Please take us through the design process from start to finish?

We wanted to give the space a contemporary and chic look, replete with lush greenery in balconies and rooftops along with a modern and luxurious interior while sticking to a neutral colour palette.

We started with a mirror and marble inlaid entryway, tastefully designed to provide a warm welcome as one steps into the home. This is followed by a large, spacious living and dining room accented in grey and gold with high ceilings that open up the space to let natural light in.

The homeowners love throwing parties and having get-togethers hence ample space dotted with tasteful furniture is perfect for hosting large gatherings or parties. Next, we designed the master bedroom with the TV unit set in the wall to tastefully hide all the cables as well as the open terraces in the green sit outs and rooftop to lounge in.

What were the highlights?

We were especially excited to have contemporary chandeliers in common areas, a delightful rooftop sit out with a great view and even a walk-in wardrobe in the master bedroom. One of our favourite parts is the display cabinet with a boutique feel with custom-designed jewellery drawers. In the bathroom we have an onyx wall, which is quite an unusual material to work with, and created a backlit effect with LED lighting. We were also particularly pleased with the decision to go with vinyl wall coverings that provided a premium upscale finish with minimal maintenance.







What is the current trend in the design space?

With the work from home trend increasingly becoming the norm, a dedicated work zone is an essential feature that we cannot do without these days. We have designed a beautiful enclosed area with walls of glass as a home office which neatly divides the space from the rest of the house yet seamlessly integrates with the overall design aesthetic.

Stay-home cooking is increasingly seen as a popular activity today. With the kitchen, storage space is critical and homeowners also prefer lots of walking room for people to cook. With the River Valley project, in particular, we designed a fully modular kitchen with ample storage space and appliances and a pull-out pantry that blends seamlessly with the rest of the space.

In terms of trends across construction and design, we are seeing interiors that include more green features. These include interior gardens and green facades. Trends like these present an opportunity for designers, like us, to explore and experiment with spaces and push boundaries of traditional design.

How do you see the future of design changing over the next few years as we recover from Covid-19?

Much of the entertainment happens at home nowadays, therefore customers are prioritising public areas of their residences. In addition, working and learning from home has become a lot more prevalent in the current times, directly impacting home design and space planning.

What are some of the most exciting opportunities in Singapore in terms of design, architecture and interiors?

In Singapore, homeowners are generally embracing urban-centric lifestyles, with many opting for modern themes and contemporary touches. With our extensive portfolio of projects within this scope, we hope to attract homeowners and demonstrate ease of attaining their ideal home which is in line with current design aesthetics while ensuring an unparalleled ease in the entire design and renovation process.

The Livspace platform in itself promises to deliver quality outcomes for our homeowners. We are constantly innovating to introduce new and exciting developments which will further revolutionise the interior design and home renovation market in Singapore.

The sofa is padded in polyurethane foam covered in 100% polyether thermally bonded onto a polyamide velveteen backing and a felt pad to protect the seat cushion. Fabric or leather upholstery, both fully removable by zippers and Velcro fastenings. Seat depth is a very spacious 64cm.

The Art of buying Art

Breathe life to your living space and give it more personality with art

Displaying art all throughout the home can really breathe life into your living spaces and infuse them with plenty of character. And now that work from home has become the default for many of us, investing in some signature pieces of art is starting to look more appealing by the day.

If you love the idea of bedazzling your walls with one-of-a-kind art pieces (or prints for that matter) but haven't the faintest clue of where to begin, we've made it easy for you with this quick checklist of art acquisition. And if all else fails, you could always let expert art consultants and buyers do the sourcing for you!

#1 Buy art that you love

Art like music is very instinctive and mood driven. So, we don't expect you to appreciate every single genre or medium. That's why it's good to spend some time on Pinterest or art galleries to see what you're drawn to. From there you can start filtering your searches based on budget. Some collectors like to focus on art that has a special meaning for them such as pop art images from their childhood, black and white photography, natural landscapes or even artists with inspiring back stories. Whatever the case may be, buying art always gives us that philanthropic feeling knowing that we are supporting the artists' rice bowls to help keep their careers going.

#2 Decide on your art spaces

The relationship between the artwork and its surroundings plays a central role when creating the overall ambience. For example, the most common spaces for entertaining are the living and dining rooms which is why people choose to hang their statement pieces there. But don't neglect smaller awkward spaces like dry bathrooms, entryways and stretches of staircase which could all benefit with a pop of colour and character from some wall art.



#3 Match the theme not the colours

A common misconception is that art has to match. Although the idea of a wall-full of black-and-white photos of your family taken at the same photoshoot seems like a well-laid plan, it might come across looking contrived and catalog-like. Instead, the choice of art should play off the theme of your interiors and the mood you're trying to convey. For example, if you enjoy the tranquility of a green room, having some prints of tropical foliage will complement your growing collection of indoor plants.

A coastal, beachy home or country-styled abode might not suit bold contemporary pieces or funky street art, but instead, prefers light, neutral or white-washed elements with touches of cool hues like blue and green.

For the bedrooms, you can choose more calming and intimate pieces that promote restful sleep like mountain-scapes, tropical flora or beach sunsets with soothing tones, or desaturated photography.



#4 It's all about and proportion and placement

Just like how you measure your walls before purchasing furniture, it's also important to measure the space that you want to fill with art. It would be weird to have an over-sized painting lord over a small sofa, and vice versa.

As a rule of thumb, the art should span the length of the furniture that it sits above, whether it's the sofa, sideboard, dining table or bed. Also keep wall art a forearm's length above the edge of your furniture, where the focal point of the image is at eye level. Placing your art off-centre also adds dimension to your space and gives it more personality.

Also, when choosing art, do ensure that it doesn't end up "fighting" with your furniture. There should be one focal point -- either the art or the furniture, but not both, unless you're into maximalism!

If you feel a large canvas might be too big of an investment, you could line up smaller pieces of matching wall art (ideally as a trendy set of three), or a salon-style gallery of mismatched frames -- both of which ooze personality and tell a story.

You don't even have to mount every art piece on the wall (good news for those who hate drilling holes). Sometimes just having them rest on a side table or bedside leaning against the wall looks just as inviting and refreshingly novel.

#5 Don't limit art to just paintings

Art doesn't always have to be an oil painting on a sheet of canvas, sometimes it can take the form of a metal sculpture, a glass vase, pottery, textile art or even a collection of clocks! It's very possible to look beyond a 2D image to find a unique piece that best reflects you and your homely surroundings.

#6 Consider the lighting

While sculptures or other mixed-media installations will benefit from more illumination from lights, do take extra care of paintings whether acrylic or watercolour. Experts always advise keeping the artwork away from natural light as this can cause the colours to fade over time. You can request for paintings and photographs to be framed up with UV-protective anti-reflective glass or Perspex. If your art wall happens to be near a window, then consider prints that are less expensive and less likely to fade.

Welcome to your new office: your home. By now you've probably clocked in at least 100 Zoom calls, many of which consisted of creative virtual filters and backdrops that may on occasion have made you appear a little ghostly. Not a good look if you're hosting webinars or making a presentation to high-level executives and directors.

We have been designing more Zoom backgrounds than dining rooms at the moment!" she shares.

The reason for this is simple: many people want to continue to operate professionally despite having to work from home. "With the work-from-home (WFH) situation still in effect, these clients want to create a solution that allows them to continue to work

seamlessly from home. Elements like video camera location, lighting, and what's in the fore and background are key to creating a professional scene. They're also of the mindset that this is a long-term solution to the WFH flexibility - a byproduct of this pandemic," says Beggs.

In terms of theme or concept, she explains that "it's less about a theme and more about who they are as a person and how that can be represented visually." But for the most part, they just want a background that's uncluttered and always pleasing to the eye.

While many private homeowners have been giving their homes extensive overhauls with many doing gut renovations and reconfiguring floorplans, those with smaller budgets or renting apartments do invest in custom furniture pieces, window dressings, wall coverings, accessories and styling.

01 String of Hearts (Ceropegia woodii)

This pretty hanging houseplant requires indirect sunlight – best placed next to a window – and is easy to maintain as long as you manage its moisture levels and not to over-water it.



04 String of Pearls (Senecio rowleyanus)

Here's a great succulent that thrives in sandy soils and relishes the early morning sun. To make sure the plant doesn't grow too long to the point that it gets torn from the roots, ensure the crowns of the pearls stay within the top of the pot.



07 Snake Plant (Dracaena trifasciata)

Also called mother-law's-tongue, the snake plant has been known to clean air better than any other houseplant – perfect for homes that live close to main roads and highways. It needs very little light or water to thrive. Just be sure to water the soil and not the leaves, as they may rot.



02 Boat Lily (Tradescantia spathacea)

This beautifully-coloured foliage brings a pop of colour wherever you put her. It enjoys being out in the sun but also relishes the afternoon shade where more vivid pinks and purples will start to show.



05 Swiss Cheese Plant (Monstera deliciosa)

A tropical beauty, this leafy plant develops holes in her leaves as she matures. It thrives under the shade in the balcony or near a window, and requires some misting every couple of days to stay plump and dewy.



08 Succulents

With their small sizes and wide variety, succulents are the perfect little plant companions for smaller rooms. Pot them individually or make a mini garden in a terrarium. They love the sun and fresh air so do place them in a well-ventilated room near a window, and avoid watering the leaves as they will rot.



03 Fiddle Leaf Fig (Ficus Lyrata)

A very low maintenance plant that can grow up to 3m in height, the Fiddle Leaf Fig only needs water when the top inch of soil looks dry. You may place it in a spot that receives indirect morning sunlight.



07 Peace Lily (Spathiphyllum)


Available in various sizes, the Peace Lily will make a great centrepiece, both on the table and on the floor. This plant also helps to cleanse the air we breathe and do well in low-lit rooms. Wait for the leaves to droop a little before giving it a good shower.



09 Orchids

These humidity-loving plants are very hardy and need only two to three tablespoons of water every two weeks. Orchids need their beauty sleep, so let them enjoy some R&R in the dark every night.
